MORRIS V Prints and Wallpapers is a beautiful selection of designs, based on original documents in the Morris & Co. archive. DESIGNS have been newly interpreted whilst retaining the integrity of the Arts & Crafts movement.

THE HAND-CRAFTED feel and unique style for which Morris is known and loved has been maintained and developed; unusual engraving techniques and earthy colours have been applied to give a bolder, less traditional feel, making this a collection to be used in both period and modern interiors.

CHRYSANTHEMUM TOILE fabrics and wallpapers have been adapted from a wallpaper sample produced by Jeffrey & Co. in 1886 as an imitation of gilded leather hangings fashionable at that time.

THISTLE is a truly simple and elegant design. In this collection it is presented as a wallpaper and reproduced as a fabric for the first time, discharge printed out of pre-dyed linen: a method often used by Morris & Co. in the 19th century.

**GRANADA** is printed on heavy textured linen and is based on a woven silk velvet brocade designed by Morris in 1884.

GRANADA wallpaper is adapted from the same design.

FIRST PRINTED in 1868-70, INDIAN wallpaper and fabric was originally printed as a wallpaper for Morris by Jeffrey & Co., and is a highly stylised interpretation of an 18th century indienne pattern.

MARY ISOBEL has been adapted from a threefold screen designed in the 1890s by J.H. Dearle and named after the embroiderer who created it.

LILY LEAF fabric and wallpaper is a delicate small scale design taken from the background of a Morris embroidery.

MORRIS ROSE was inspired by patterns on the ornate, gold-leaf panels in Morris' interiors.

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**TANGLEY**, a Bannister Hall design of 1837, first produced by Morris in 1868, was used by Queen Victoria at Windsor Castle.


TULIP & ROSE a highly textural print is taken from an 1876 archive weave; the first datable design by Morris for woven furnishings.

OTHER WALLPAPER DESIGNS IN THIS COLLECTION NOT SHOWN HERE ARE:

RED HOUSE, inspired by a painted ceiling in a former Morris residence.

GILT TRELLIS, adapted from one of Morris' early designs showing small motifs influenced by imported Indian textiles.

HONEYCOMBE an early 18th century reproduction that sits well with the larger patterns.

The Sunflower velvet featured on the above curtains and cushion creates a sumptuous, rich and glamorous interior. The complementing quality Woodford Check wool design works in harmony with Morris prints and has a rich and natural colour palette. The above sofa covered in the new Standen weave sits beautifully with both designs from this latest launch and also existing Morris products.





Minstrel . Acanthus Scroll

Cray weave is an elegant and beautiful adaptation of this Morris classic, further demonstrating the opportunity of using Morris in a contemporary setting. Acanthus Scroll shown on the cushion above is inspired by the original block print wallpaper designed by William Morris in 1874. Minstrel chenille covering the opposite sofa offers a sophisticated and contemporary twist to the Morris look.



Trellis is one of the most recognisable of Morris' designs and originally designed for his own home "The Red House". The Trellis design has never before been launched as a fabric, which sought inspiration from the original block print. At last the Morris renowned wallpaper has been reproduced as a surface printed wallpaper.

This autumn sees Morris & Co. venture into an exciting new era as two striking, decorative collections beautifully capture the historic essence of the Morris brand. Drawing inspiration from documents found within the original and extensive Morris archive, the collection is made up of a mix of embroideries and weaves which have been expertly crafted to illustrate the distinct decorative style and bold colours for which Morris was known.

Within these collections many of William Morris' best known designs have been updated through variation of scale and vivacious colouring. Distinct vibrant teals, rich cranberries and soft golds have been taken from the palette for which Morris was famously known and have come full circle to feature in the most contemporary interiors.





The Archive Prints II Collection blends faithful reproductions of original wallpaper and fabric archive documents with new adaptations of William Morris' tapestry and typography designs creating a collection that embodies the very essence of Morris & Co. whilst appealing to a 21<sup>st</sup> century audience.

All Morris & Co. prints and wallpapers are designed and made in the UK by highly skilled craftsmen and women with meticulous care and scrupulous attention to detail.

#### LODDEN - 1883

This beautiful Morris pattern was designed for fabric and was one of many designs created by William Morris between 1882 and 1885, all of which were discharge printed at Merton Abbey. The pattern of scrolling flowers and foliage has been faithfully reproduced from the original fabric in the Morris & Co. Archive.

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#### BAMBOO - 1872

BAMBOO has been adapted from a design by E.W. Godwin. The wallpaper was originally block printed by Jeffrey & Co., who also printed Morris & Co. wallpapers at this time and samples of the original papers can be found in the Morris & Co. Archive. This adaptation of BAMBOO is taken from the original handpainted watercolour design housed in the V&A.

#### STRAWBERRY THIEF - 1883

STRAWBERRY THIEF is one of Morris' most famous designs for fabric and was originally indigo discharge printed at Merton Abbey. Morris was inspired to design STRAWBERRY THIEF after watching thrushes stealing strawberries from the kitchen garden of his countryside home, Kelmscott Manor, in Oxfordshire.

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#### FOREST - 2013

FOREST is inspired by 'The Forest Tapestry' designed by William Morris, Philip Webb and J.H. Dearle, woven in 1887 at Merton Abbey, in South London, by Morris & Co.'s three most senior weavers. 'The Forest Tapestry' depicts scrolling acanthus leaves, a lion, peacock, hare and fox, amongst bunches of wild flowers. Designed by Alison Gee, this digitally printed adaptation of the tapestry takes some of the most charming elements and combines them with other references to create a repeating design.

#### DAISY - 1864

Inspired by medieval tapestries, William Morris and his wife Jane first embroidered daisy motifs in 1860 for their home, Red House. Although DAISY was the second wallpaper to be designed by Morris, it was the first Morris & Co. wallpaper to be hand block printed and proved to be one of the most popular of all 'The Firm's' wallpapers.

#### LOVE IS ENOUGH - 2013

LOVE IS ENOUGH pays tribute to Morris' many skills as a writer, poet and typographer. Morris believed that a beautiful book came second only to a beautiful house. In this charming design by Alison Gee, the title phrase of Morris' play 'Love is Enough', published in 1872, appears in Morris' typeface set upon a pretty leaf pattern which is based on the wall design in the Green Dining Room at the Victoria & Albert Museum.

#### LARKSPUR - 1875

The original pattern was created by Morris as a single colour block print wallpaper first issued in 1872. In 1875 Morris redrew the pattern incorporating 12 printing blocks and thereby giving more colour and depth to the design which became an instant success and far more popular than the original monochrome version.

#### BIRD & POMEGRANATE - 1926

BIRD & POMEGRANATE was one of the last patterned wallpaper designs to be issued by Morris & Co. and although unattributed, was possibly designed by Dearle and inspired by the much earlier design FRUIT.

#### PINK AND ROSE - 1890

Designed by Morris, the original PINK AND ROSE wallpaper was hand block printed using two sets of printing blocks to create the vertical pattern repeat of 82cms. This large scale, stylised design has now been adapted as a furnishing fabric that recreates the subtle effects of the transparent inks used to print the original wallpaper. It is also once more available as a wallpaper.

#### ACANTHUS - 1874

The outstanding ACANTHUS block printed wallpaper is one of Morris' most instantly recognisable designs and marks the beginning of a period in which he created largescale designs for wallpaper. These often featured layered patterns and rich colours with vigorous curves and scrolling foliage to give a three-dimensional quality.

#### CHRYSANTHEMUM - 1877

First printed in 1877, CHRYSANTHEMUM was heavily influenced by the national flower of Japan and was block printed on foiled paper which was lacquered, stamped and stencilled in oil colour, a technique perfected by Jeffrey & Co. to simulate the expensive Japanese Leather Papers imported by Arthur Sanderson. CHRYSANTHEMUM was also printed using the traditional hand block printing method and it is from this that Morris & Co. has now recreated the design.

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#### LEICESTER - 1912

Inspired by Morris' earlier design BACHELORS BUTTON of 1892, LEICESTER was designed as a block printed wallpaper by John Henry Dearle.

William Morris first employed J.H. Dearle as a teenage assistant and during his career Dearle was responsible for designing some of the best loved and most enduring Morris & Co. designs.

# The Archive Collections 150 Years of Arts & Crafts Design

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William Morris, artist, philosopher and political theorist, was one of the most outstanding and influential designers of the Arts & Crafts Movement and through his company, Morris & Co. he produced some of the most fashionable and exciting textiles and wallpapers of his era. Other designers, most notably J.H. Dearle, who later became Artistic Director of the firm also contributed to the collections.

To mark the 150 year anniversary Morris & Co. is launching four collections; ARCHIVE PRINTS, ARCHIVE WALLPAPERS, ARCHIVE WEAVES and ARCHIVE EMBROIDERIES. In creating these collections the design studio has revisited some of the best loved designs housed in the Morris & Co. Archive as well as taking reference from textiles found within Morris' homes.

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# Archive Wallpaper

Morris' wallpaper designs are among the best-known examples of his work and he personally designed 46 wallpapers and 5 ceiling papers over his career. Archive Wallpapers is a selection of 11 iconic designs from the Morris & Co. archive, reproduced as faithfully to the originals as possible in scale and colour.

## PIMPERNEL (1876)

This pattern is typical of Morris' greatest designs and hung in the dining room at Kelmscott House, Hammersmith.

## GARDEN CRAFT (1908)

Garden Craft was designed as a wallpaper by W.A.S. Benson in 1908 and is shown here woven in a classic cotton damask quality.



# Archive Prints

In producing the Archive Prints Collection, the studio has retained the characteristics of hand block printing and some of the original colourations. The Collection includes original designs by Morris & Co. with new designs painted by the present design team and inspired by Morris' woven tapestries and embroideries.

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# Archive Embroideries

Morris & Co. produced a number of embroidery designs often in kit form. This collection reintroduces exquisite designs by Jane Morris, May Morris and John Henry Dearle alongside new embroidery interpretations of wallpaper designs.

#### KELMSCOTT TREE (2011)

The inspiration for this design can be seen on the bed curtains surrounding the four poster bed situated in Morris' bedroom at Kelmscott Manor, owned by The Society of Antiquaries of London. The curtains were embroidered in 1891 by May Morris and friends. The bed hangings were probably made for Morris' birthday

and each curtain took three months to complete. Kelmscott Tree has been painted by Alison Gee in the Morris studio and has been interpreted as a print and an embroidery.

#### ORCHARD (2011)

This charming design by Alison Gee was inspired by Morris & Co.'s mediaeval tapestries.

#### MARIGOLD (1875)

Designed by Morris at a time when his designs were becoming more intricate, full of fluidity and movement; it was one of the few designs he produced for both wallpaper and fabric.

### GARDEN TULIP (1885)

Most of Morris' wallpapers are densely textured and complex, however Garden Tulip shows a simpler design of tulip stems meandering over a leafy ground. Shown here as an embroidery it is also available as a wallpaper.

### JANE'S DAISY (1860s)

This design is based on a wall-hanging in Kelmscott Manor dating from the early 1860s. This contemporary looking embroidery, previously known as Sunflower, is an early Morris pattern, possibly embroidered by Morris, his wife Jane and her sister for Red House, their first home.

## MARY ISOBEL (circa 1890s)

This embroidery was designed by Dearle and shows scrolling acanthus leaves and flowers. The original fabric was embroidered in Adelaide, Australia by Mary Isobel Barr Smith who probably ordered it from Morris & Co. as a kit. The Morris Studio first produced this design, printed on linen, in 2008. It is now embroidered on linen and on 100% silk.

#### SCROLL (1871) BRANCH (1871)

Scroll reflects Morris' preoccupation with mediaeval book illustration and is smaller in scale and more delicate than many other Morris designs. The gently meandering layout of leaves and marigold flowers sit on a background of the Branch wallpaper design.

#### MEADOW SWEET (1904)

Designed by John Henry Dearle, symmetrical motifs of plants are arranged in a formal design which is typical of the Arts & Crafts style.

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# Archive Weaves

Morris & Co. produced a number of jacquard weave and tapestry fabrics. In this collection the studio has faithfully reproduced some of these classic textiles, whilst introducing new jacquard and tapestry interpretations of the most loved Morris & Co. wallpaper designs.

#### FRUIT (1864)

Morris' Fruit wallpaper, also known as Pomegranate, from 1864 was one of the first designs he produced and has now been adapted in a tapestry quality. It is available also as a wallpaper.

#### WILLOW BOUGH (1887)

Willow Bough was designed by William Morris for wallpaper in 1887 and can be seen in Jane Morris' bedroom at Kelmscott Manor as well as many other Morris houses. A naturalistic treatment of one of Morris' favourite themes, it continues to be one of Morris' best loved designs. Willow Bough has been translated into a fine jacquard weave quality.

#### **KENNET** (1883)

Kennet was produced by William Morris at Merton Abbey and was originally printed by the indigo discharge method whereby colours were printed onto a dyed indigo cloth using a bleaching agent which bleached out the ground colour and in the same process printed reds, greens and yellows in its place.

## BLUEBELL (1876)

Bluebell - (originally known as Columbine) was based on a rare collection of Rhenish 15th century printed linens that Morris first admired in the South Kensington Museum, although they were later discovered to be fakes. This elegant symmetrical design has been printed with a subtle texture to reproduce the faded effect evident today on many of Morris' original fabrics.

## ACANTHUS TAPESTRY (1875)

Acanthus is one of Morris' most iconic patterns and has been reproduced in many forms since it was first registered in 1875. It is reproduced here as a tapestry.

## **BRANCH** (1871)

Taken from the wallpaper design, Branch is now woven in 'cut and loop pile' velvet.

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#### PEACOCK AND DRAGON (1878)

Peacock and Dragon was designed by William Morris and originally manufactured in wool twill on a handloom. Morris studied early woven textiles and the Peacock and Dragon design was based on Sicilian silk weaves dating from the 15th and 16th century. In keeping with Morris' original version, it is available as a wool jacquard.

### CROWN IMPERIAL (1876)

Crown Imperial is one of Morris' most formal patterns. It was originally woven by power loom in wool and mohair and is now reproduced in wool.

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
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## GOLDEN LILY (1899)

John Henry Dearle was originally hired to design backgrounds in tapestries and he drew on his experience for this design with its rich patterning and colours. It demonstrates his ability to generate designs which are so close to Morris in style and colour that they have often been mistakenly attributed to him.



### STRAWBERRY THIEF (1883)

Strawberry Thief was inspired by a real-life problem for many gardeners. Morris tried to grow strawberries at Kelmscott Manor but found they were often eaten by greedy birds. This iconic design was originally indigo discharge printed and has now been reproduced on 100% cotton with subtle textures to retain the look of the original hand-print.

### KELMSCOTT TRELLIS (1894-1895)

The bedspread in Morris' bedroom at Kelmscott Manor has inspired this elegant embroidery. The original was embroidered by Jane Morris and friends. In keeping with the original design, it features delicate motifs of flowers and fruit within a scrolling trellis embroidered on linen.

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#### ARTICHOKE (1898)

This design by John Henry Dearle features a magnificent artichoke motif that fills the entire width of the wallpaper. Originally multi-coloured, this new monotone version allows the boldness of the shape to create impact.
