

New editions of emblematic textile prints, carefully conserved archives, current artistic favorites or orders executed by our best designers, this new collection of designs expresses the importance of eclecticism for Pierre Frey.

Known and recognized for bold, extraordinary prints inspired by travel to far-away places, Pierre Frey tends to place these motifs on walls.

Designed for the «happy few», these variations will thrill connoisseurs, enthusiasts and all those who love inspired interior decoration.



ARTY

A gallery in the 11th arrondissement, an artist, love at first sight. Marie-Cécile Aptel favors large formats that present shapes drawn with a brush or pastels on colored surfaces, revealing the underlying canvas in spots. Her abstract works give rise to a thrill of feeling.

This is why we chose to adapt one of her works as a wallpaper. The choice of a vinyl backing for this creation reinforces the theme of the artist's work by highlighting the texture of the canvas. This design is also available as a fabric: F2977.

LEO

The result of considering both ceramics and fabrics, «Leo» was born from the encounter of Patrick Frey and the Buffile studio. Following the abstract current, the artist throws paint on his canvas like the famous Jackson Pollock. The choice of a vinyl backing for this creation reinforces the theme of the artist's work by highlighting the texture of the canvas. This design is also available as a fabric: F2894.

TAKE AWAY

Taken from the «Love & Life in a Broken World" series by the artist Art Tatter, "TAKE AWAY" is an original piece constructed from the accumulated thickness of plain posters that are glued to a wall and then ripped.

SPLASH

An effect of different-colored inks, the expression of controlled spontaneity.

The choice of a vinyl backing for this creation reinforces the theme of the artist's work by highlighting the texture of the canvas.

PORTOR

Created by Mathias Kiss.

A continuation of his research on folding and the deformation of stiff materials, this collaboration with Pierre Frey was initiated by «Wallpaper» magazine and echoes the artist's personal work by associating one of his painted marbles to wallpaper. The motif symbolizes the origin of marble, the quarry, the raw stone, the material... and its application in furnishings. Vinyl backing. This design is also available as a fabric: F5534.

NO TOYS ALLOWED

For a number of years , Toxic , a leading artist of the street art scene, chose to direct his art on canvas. This pattern printed on non-woven in three panels, reproduces a colorful sprayed work by the artist.

EIGHTY THIRTY

This artwork celebrates the 80 years anniversary of the Maison Pierre Frey and the 30 years of Toxic's career. The artist is a pionneer of the grafitti movement of the eighties. New York trains and walls were his first means of expression. As Jean-Michel Basquiat that he knew, his art denounces discrimination and violence against the black community.



MONDES

This series of hyperrealistic globes was painted by watercolorist Jean-Pierre Marladot.

Earths and moons, loaned by a great collector, blend together and ask only to spin around their axis! This design is also available as a fabric: F3205 (Collection January 2017).

DIWALI

This wallpaper represents a celebration day in India. Under a blue sky, the festival of lights is in full swing. Festivities last for five days and highlight legends and traditions.

EN FILE INDIENNE

The souvenir of a trip to India, these four Indian scenes represent joyous parades. These paintings were originally made on silk rectangles. This wallpaper superimposes the four scenes to enrich the story. A paneled composition allows using this wallpaper as a decorative touch in a single panel or, on the contrary, to plunge into the story by repeating the panels to obtain a rhythmic repetition of contrasting colors.

Artisanal backing in hand-woven raffia.

KHAO SOK

At the end of the world, in the south of Thailand. Painted like a toile de Jouy, the design represents an elephant, a tiger and a palace in the midst of sumptuous vegetation. A metal finish enhances the rendering of the motifs and sets off the high-quality printing on raffia.

Artisanal backing in hand-woven raffia.

MASAI MARA

Inspired by a nature reserve located in southwest Kenya, this design depicts a calm animal world where elephants, primates and parrots mingle peacefully.

MARABOUT

With a tribal inspiration, this wallpaper reproduces masks with zoomorphic shapes that were directly influenced by the most beautiful statuettes of African art. This design is also available as a fabric: F2978.

VUE D'EN HAUT

«Vue d'en Haut» is a painting inspired by the aerial photograph of a tropical forest. This design is also available as a fabric: F3204 (collection january 2017).


COSTA RICA





UGO GATTONI, RISE

Ugo Gattoni is a French Surrealist artist who depicts urban landscapes and extraordinary settings in a whirlwind of minute details. He likes to plunge the spectator into another world and tell a story; this is why he prefers large drawings. With a fine-tipped pen, India ink and a magnifying glass, he takes his inspiration from his teeming imagination, dedicating several months and hundreds of hours to each creation. Ugo Gattoni is currently working on collaborations with Hermès and Ruinart, as well as for the Nike brand.

LOUISE BOURGOIN, LE COUPLE

Passionate about drawing, actress Louise Bourgoin met fabrics editor Patrick Frey and introduced him to her creations. Particularly impressed by the way of drawing of the artist, he was immediately taken by the fluid, unapologetic lines of her pen and ink drawings, refraining from rubber components and mistakes, he proposes to create a collection for the maison Pierre Frey. First published in fabric, "The couple" drawing is now adapted into wallpaper.





RISE

«Once upon a time long ago, lost among clouds and mountains, men and women lived in a city that was so high you could measure the sky from it.

A city built on the scale of giants, with the hope and wish that its inhabitants could pull themselves up by their souls to the height of the Titans.

In the heart of this ocean of life, the reign of a King and Queen began.

They governed hand in hand, and their people thrived.

One day, a rotten odor drifted in from afar, a fragrance of redness. For the first time, the sovereigns saw a rain fall that corroded the softness of the city's stones. It was cold and there was hunger. The city became a pile of stones, then ruins.
